**F**irst up let me say this. If you are planning your first fishing trip up north and you really want the best chance of it being successful then book a respected fishing tour operator.

Even if it is only for a day. Without a doubt, going with a guide should be the least troublesome way of getting onto fish, and fully catered tours make magnificent holidays where even your beers can be opened for you. For the novice however, the most important thing is that you should, if requested, be provided with the right gear, be put in the right place and even tutored if that is what it takes for you to be successful.

You see the formula of a fishing guide is simple; **Clients + fish = money** which is squared by the client being happy enough to return book. Guides really do want you to catch fish and the bigger the better. That way, the photos you take will tempt your mates into booking their services as well. Naturally all this tender loving care comes at a cost

and you are probably going to have to hand over lots of your hard earned fun tickets for the privilege. Still the knowledge you can gain in a short period of time often represents a sound investment. If you have the money, go for it.

Nevertheless, what one person can spend on a week's fishing with a guide, a couple of mates or a small family not opposed to camping, can finance a self-run fishing holiday up north for two to four weeks. It depends a bit on how much you want to rough it, and what equipment you have at your disposal to start with.
